An interview with ex-pupil Laura Smith MP

On Friday 8th March a past pupil of Wybunbury Delves, Laura Smith our local MP, came to visit. She was given a tour of the school, visited each of the classes and I interviewed her.

Laura Smith was born in 1985 and was brought up in Nantwich attending Wybunbury Delves C.E. Primary School between 1989 and 1996.

What are your fondest memories of being at Wybunbury Delves?

The friends I made, the anticipation and excitement before going on stage for our nativities and plays, one of my kind teachers Mrs Frizell and our amazing cook's delicious crumble and custard.

What were your favourite subjects at school?

The creative subjects such as English and art, I also enjoyed history.

What was your favourite book as a child and why?

Enid Blyton's 'The Famous Five' series because my mum was really good at reading them to me as bedtime stories.

Who did you most admire as a child and why?

I most admired my family, especially my mum and dad because they were strong hardworking people.

Laura Smith attended Brine Leas Secondary School for her GCSE's before going onto South Cheshire College for her A Levels. She then went onto Manchester Metropolitan University to complete a degree in Primary Education. She was a Primary School teacher before founding a tutoring business called 'One-to-One Learning UK' based in Nantwich. She worked with 100's of schoolchildren in the local area offering support to those lacking in confidence.

Why is education so important?

It helps to develop the child and enable them to have fun. It is important for them to have as many experiences as possible to prepare them for the outside world.

What advice do you have for children growing up today?

To look for things that drive you and matter to you, hold onto these and keep working, never say you cannot do it.

In 2017, she was selected as the Labour Party candidate for Crewe and Nantwich. She won the snap election of that year and has been our local MP ever since.

What do you most like about being an MP?

Coming out into the community, seeing the people, and helping to achieve change.

What issues today are most affecting the future of the younger generation?

Climate change and that not all children are able to get an education.

How do you think children can get involved?

Promoting what is happening to the planet by communicating and talking. Encourage their parents to get the government to invest more money into education.

If you were a super hero what would your superpower be and why?

To hold time so I can get all my jobs done and still have plenty of spare time because women balance so much.
