DfE guidance

Q. What information will schools have to publish online on the use of the Pupil Premium?

A. Schools have to publish details of their Pupil Premium allocation and plans to spend in the current year. Schools also need to provide a statement confirming the previous year's allocation, how the money was spent and the impact this had on the educational attainment of their disadvantaged pupils.

- <u>Schools are free to spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit.</u> However, they will be held accountable for how they have used the additional funding to support pupils from **low income families.**
- The Pupil Premium is allocated by count of children from low-income families who are currently known to be eligible for **free school meals** (FSM) in both mainstream and non-mainstream settings and children who have been looked after continuously for more than six months. The Government has decided that eligibility for the Pupil Premium in 2012-13 will be extended to pupils who have been eligible for **FSM at any point in the last 6 years** called 'Ever6'.
- The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for FSM and their wealthier peers by ensuring that **funding to tackle disadvantage** reaches the pupils who need it the most.
- Total funding through the Premium will increase from £625m in 2011-12 to £1.25BN in 2012-13.
- The level of the premium in 2011-12 was £488 per pupil for pupils eligible for FSM and for pupils in care who have been continuously looked after for six months. It increased to £623 per pupil in 2012-13 and from April 2013 increased to £900.
